**PURPOSE:** Presentation on the initiative to sell city-owned property for development

**REASON:** Inform City Council Members of the My Home Initiative program and the effort to sell city-owned property for development

**RECOMMENDATION:** For information only

**BACKGROUND:** The city owns over 100 vacant lots, and several lots with improvements. The comprehensive plan and the strategic plan for the city is to get these vacant lots back on the real estate roles of the city and in the hands of citizens. The "My Home Initiative" aims to do just that by offering to a citizen, a public servant, an existing homeowner and a developer the opportunity to purchase the vacant lot and within an established time line develop a single family residential unit on the property. The initiative has three categories for citizens, developers or existing homeowners to participate. Purchase the vacant land to construct a home, purchase the corner lot to consolidate with an existing lot, or a developer will have the opportunity to purchase contiguous land for the development of a subdivision. Applicants who participate in this program will be referred to a housing counseling agency, who will take them through the pre-qualification process. The program is a collaborative effort of local government, non-profit organizations, and the financial community.





Acting City Attorney Mark Flynn stated that it was City Council's desire to enter into a closed session under Section 2.2-3711.A (1) of the Code of Virginia under Subsection 1 for discussion of performance of personnel of appointees, employees or officials of the City specifically the City Manager and City Attorney; under Subsection 3 to discuss pending litigation with South Central Wastewater Authority.

Vice Mayor Parham moved that the City Council go into closed session for the purposes noted by the Assistant City Attorney. The motion was seconded by Council Member Hart. There was no discussion on the motion, which was approved on roll call vote.

Dolores Smith, 410 Mistletoe Street, said, "You all are always having closed session but that it seems like you never have an open session and let the people know what is going on. I mean we do not even know what is going on. This is the most important thing. I say that every one of you all that are sitting in those seats are not there to warm the seats. You are there to get some information to the people of what's going on. This is what they want to know. We do not seem to be getting that. One of those was a question. I know sometimes that you all say that you will get back with us later but we see nothing later either. We would like to know what is going on and we like to have some open sessions. You all come back and let the people know what is going on and what you all are doing. Also another thing that I would like to know is if the City is given money to help pay the bills who is going to hold it. Who is going to handle that? Another thing is that you all that have wards it

would be such a good idea to go out in your wards even if there is nothing but just once a week and see what is going on. You have some houses that look like trees because the trees have covered up the property. The owners need to know what is going on with these properties and what not. The back doors are open and windows are broken out. This is your ward and that you all are not there. You are behind the wall and the seats. We need you to interact with the people and let us know what is going on.”

Linwood Christian, 410 Mistletoe Street, said, “First on behalf of the President of the Harding Street Neighborhood Association, Mrs. Dolores Smith, we would like to thank the Senator Rosalyn Dance and Delegate Lashrecse Aird who we work together with at the Voter Education Forum. Especially in light of some of the things that went on with people trying to get their rights back. And of course the Republican Party what they did and the Governor had to do what he did. We had a nice little turnout. And so again I would like to thank them for working with us. Also one thing that I would also like to say too as a citizen is that I remember when it was put in the paper about all of the bills and the citizens not paying their taxes. I just want to say this too. I definitely believe in using public information and going down there and finding out some stuff. I would say to those elected officials that why your blaming me and my fellow citizens for not paying our taxes who are we to blame when you do not pay yours. We have a few City officials who are not paying their bills. We are not talking about \$4 or \$5. We are talking about \$4,500 or more. So remember that when you are put out there that we the citizens that you too need to pay your bills and the same goes for you buddies. They need to pay their bills too. Also I saw where we just hired a new City Attorney and all of that is wonderful. The person that was chosen is a wonderful man but the salary that he is getting is \$1,000 or more shy of what recreation could have had instead to keep the summer program in place. Then you are hiring someone to look for a City Manager when the City already cannot pay their bills like they supposed too and cannot pay some of their workers. But you are going to hire somebody to go look for a City Manager when you need to keep what we have right here for at least another year until we get out of this mess. This is what we need to do. I am tired as well as other poor folk in this City of caring the burden of mismanagement. Because that’s what it is when you are already talking about the City is this and the City is that but then you go hire a firm to make recommendations that are going to put our young people in jeopardy because it will not be any program for them next summer. Then you go hire a firm to hire a City Manager when we already have some that is capable of doing the job. Last but not least a few years ago we talked about the CCRA and a few other commissions. I just want to say this before you decide to do away with the CCRA you cannot do it until you have a public hearing and go before the house of delegates because it is written in our chart. Thank you.”

Talibah Majeed, 1847 Brandon Avenue, stated, “This weekend my friend and I went to Hopewell to the Farmer’s Market because unfortunately we do not have a Farmer’s Market here. After going around Hopewell and seeing all the wonderful things that they have there we came back to Petersburg and saw all of the wonderful things that we have here. My friend pointed out some of the places that warmed her heart when she was a child, the neighbor’s house, her grandmother’s house and the historic buildings. Earlier in the week a friend from work took me to dinner at the Rajun Cajun which I definitely recommend. It was absolutely great. She doesn’t live in Petersburg but she loves the restaurants in Petersburg. There are a lot of good things in Petersburg that really would attract people if they weren’t so discouraged by all the craziness that is going on in Petersburg. It is very tiring and very depressing to have to answer questions about Petersburg and what’s going on. It seems like there is layers and layers of things going on. The last thing that I heard really bothered me which was something that was already mentioned. This is paying a firm to do a selection process for a City Manager. It is a very important position but we have people who are making six figures in the City. If they are not competent enough to put together a committee to choose a City Manager then this is where some of the saving should be. Get rid of those people.

Tomeika Moody, 1862 E. Boulevard, stated, “I have a question about drainage down here in Old Towne because we are having another storm I think Saturday morning. Are there any work crews going around trying to repair drains so far? I haven’t seen anyone but it’s just a question. Also since we are hiring a firm to find a new City Manager, is this the same firm that Rosalyn Dance recommended to hire the last guy? I am just checking and I hope not.”

Barb Rudolph, 1675 Mt. Vernon Street, stated, “I would like to talk about some of the operational changes that are being implemented as a result of budget cuts. What stands out to me is the absence of a

coherent plan and the consequences this has happened. A number of us proposed alternative budget reductions which ended up being ignored by City leaders. I am not here to talk about that but there seems to be a hog of spending cuts which are not included on the approved plan which are being implemented anyway. I won't take the time to go through all that. The main point is that we haven't really learned of anyone other than public safety employees losing the use of City provided vehicles or their City provided local phones or their data plans. These are various other material benefit and privileges that Petersburg employees seem to believe are their right. Those of use working for other government organizations or in the private sectors look on amazed at the sense of entitlement demonstrated by City leaders and City employees. Likewise, extra layers of supervisors and a number of administrative support staff are alien to those who are not immersed in Petersburg City Government unique organizational culture. Meanwhile, the screws are being turned tighter on the public safety organizations and other entities as well. The consequence for many employees include their pay has been cut 10%. Who knows when it will be restored and how it will affect their retirement. The City is not paying into the retirement as they should and are many months behind. This is a recurring problem. Operational support for work units are being reduced or withdrawn. Vehicles and equipment are not being maintained and we all know that this has been in the news a lot for public safety. Folks working for the City are relying on colleagues or caring citizens to keep things going. Some of our employees have marketable skills and they can look for a position in a more stable work environment. One that appears to have more concern for its employees then does Petersburg City. We are losing some of our best and brightest. Management is creative budget savings by doing everything in their power to drive off dedicated employees. I do not know if that's an intentional or unintentional consequence. This is what's happening. I say good for those employees if they leave for better job prospects. The result of all this is instant savings from that last chance scenario which is budgeting by attrition. Attrition is the gradual decline in the number of strength due to constant stress, which I think the constant stress is what's being put on our employees. This method used to produce savings has nothing to do with the tough and necessary job of prioritizing what's important to maintain and then cutting the excessive and unnecessary. It just shows the lack of foresight and guts on the part of you, the leaders. Thank you."

Gina Harrison, 1687 South Crater Road, stated, "I just want to touch on a couple of items. One is our HR practice. I was originally told by somebody outside the City of Petersburg that our HR Department has dropped the ball on providing adequate notice of personnel to people who were being laid off, therefore, having to push out the date of their lay-off causing more money from the City that we do not have obviously. And that this was the announcement of the reason why the museums were staying open. The same department has a history of not vetting employees very well and amazingly enough has a history of leaking items out to the public, schools and everywhere. I think that this needs to be looked into its not professional and you pay this person a lot of money. It needs to be looked at and I would appreciate it. All of our tax dollars are paying these large salaries. The other thing I wanted to make a point of is the emergency workers are still getting this 10% cut and their leaving. I think we are down to a little bit over 60 police officers for the whole City I have been told and some with one foot out the door. That's a big concern for me as a resident. When something happens I expect the police to be there. Of course, if my house is getting broken into and someone is getting shot down the street they are not going to come to my house. That's a big problem. So I think that maybe Council and the City Manager needs to look back at some of the alternative budget cuts that were offered and explain to us why they haven't taken them into account. In an effort to stop the 10% cut to our emergency workers and maybe lay-off non-essential. I would rather have high tall grass on the corner then have less police on the ground. Thanks."

Samuel Rhue, 1952 South Westchester Drive, stated, "In difficult times like this I think that it is very important that we have updated financial statements. We have passed the first quarter. We should be getting a quarterly financial statement. I want to know how revenues are tracking on current revenues, taxes being collected and on delinquent taxes. In addition to this, we should be close to looking at expenses and how we track it against other expenses and also the unpaid liabilities. I would suggest that those be considered monthly and that you should be getting those reports every month so we can know exactly where we stand in order to manage through this process. Lastly, tourism is a very important piece of what Petersburg is all about. With the meals tax going up and all these changes I know you have a proposal with tourism and you want to make sure that it stays in place and draws visitors and individuals to this City to spend money at small businesses."

Gloria Brown, 1557 South Sycamore Street, stated, "I am here to talk about a couple of things. Communications as I mentioned in a couple of our City Council meeting has to be across the board. City Council has to know what is going on so that the citizens know what is going on and we do not get to a City Council meeting and City Council do not know what is going on. We have to have communication each and every day. Let's start acting like adults and handle business in the City. This is just so old to me. I know we are better than this. I think for my FOIA request about cars and cell phones. There are 400 cell phones that are used by City employees. I know what our data plan looks like with three. So instead of pay cuts across the board of people barely making over minimum wage, I did not know that we had over 400 employees to give cell phones too. That should be eliminated. That is a cost savings of hundreds and thousands of dollars a year. I do not know about the cars but that the cell phones are nonessential. Everyone that has a cellphone gets a discount. My husband gets a discount and he does not have a City cellphone. He gets a discount by the state. That is a cost savings. I asked before to rescind those raises. I do not know why it's a deer in headlights about the raises that were given from the previous administration. That's a cost saving of one million dollars. I do not understand that tourism is such an important factor. We have to close museums but people got \$20,000, \$30,000 and \$40,000 raises. This is really not cool. I am going to continue to say this because I need to know. The gossip is all over the place. Where is the accountability from Steve Hicks and Johnson Controls that really tipped over this cart? Who was in the meeting to make that deal that went sour and now all of us are paying for it. I really like to know what went on in the meeting and who is responsible. Thank you."

**9. BUSINESS OR REPORTS FOR/FROM THE MAYOR OR OTHER MEMBERS OF CITY COUNCIL:**

- a. Consideration of approval to request Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) provides supplement assistance in the resurfacing project on Crater Road from E. Washington Street to .11 miles north of the I-95 ramp.

**BACKGROUND:** In July 2016 the City received a grant from VDOT to complete a resurfacing project on Crater Road from E. Washington Street to .11 Mile North of the I-95. Typically, the City must pay for the services prior to being reimbursed. In light of the City's financial hardships, VDOT has agreed to provide supplemental assistance with the grant dollars that were to be reimbursed to the City. This will also help save cost of materials as the State is able to purchase items at a lower cost. The Public Works Director will certify the final product.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Recommend City Council approved the request to permit VDOT to provide supplemental assistance in resurfacing Crater Road from E. Washington St. to .11 Miles North of the I-95 ramp and allow the Public Works Director to sign project agreements.

**BACKGROUND:** Virginia Tourism Corporation's Drive Tourism team met with City staff, business owners and citizens to make the City a Drive Tourism certified community. Tourism destinations and planning needs were determined and grant funding was sought and acquired through VTC. Funds will be used to revamp and implement plans to create walkable areas around the waterfront and Old Towne areas.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Recommend Council approve the attached appropriation for \$10,000 from the Virginia Tourism Commission.

**16-ORD-43 AN ORDINANCE, AS AMENDED, SAID ORDINANCE MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR COMMENCING JULY 1, 2016, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2017 IN THE SPECIAL FUNDS FUND IN THE AMOUNT OF \$10,000 FOR VIRGINIA TOURISM COMMISSION FUNDS.**

Council Member Wilson-Smith stated, "Good evening to everyone. Thank you so much for coming out to your City Council Meeting. At our last City Council meeting I presented a PowerPoint to council and to the citizens. Since then the PowerPoint was sent to all of council and I did stipulate that I would come back today to discuss portions of that PowerPoint. In addition since then we have also gotten the updated budget amendment which was dated for October 3<sup>rd</sup>. So based on these two documents I would like to speak about some things. First is in "Item 6" on the PowerPoint I suggested a savings of over \$84,000, however, the amended budget shows new figures for lodging, travel and dues. Those figures total \$26,522. We are no longer members of NLC or VML so traveling isn't something that we should still have on this document. Therefore, with consideration to both items I like to make a motion to amend the budget deleting these items for a savings of \$26,522."

Council Member Wilson-Smith made a motion to amend the budget deleting these items (lodging, travel and dues) for a savings of \$26,522. The motion was seconded by Council Member Hart. The motion was approved on roll call. On roll call vote, voting yes: Coleman, Hart, Hill, Moore, Wilson-Smith, Parham and Myers

Council Member Wilson-Smith stated, "Under the City Manager's budget I discussed in the PowerPoint that there is \$20,000 allotted for beautification and supplies. I had suggested that we delete that but that I would like to ask Ms. Belton if she could explain exactly what beautification supplies are under that budget."

Ms. Belton stated, "The beautification line items under the City Manager budget was actually moved from the Public Works budget. It represents the match to the Department of Environmental Qualities Grant."

The grant is approximately average annually around \$10,000. I know those funds are used to match that. As the match is not a requirement some reduction in that line item would not slow the beautification efforts that the grant intends for us to do through the Department of Environmental Quality."

Council Member Wilson-Smith stated, "With it not being a requirement would we still meet the match if it was taken from \$20,000 to \$10,000?"

Ms. Belton stated, "Yes, we would."

Council Member Wilson-Smith stated, "Then based on this conversation, the budget and this presentation I would like to make a motion that we change that line item from \$20,000 to \$10,000, saving us \$10,000."

Council Member Wilson-Smith made a motion to change the line item from \$20,000 to \$10,000. The motion was seconded by Council Member Hill. The motion was approved on roll call. On roll call vote, voting yes: Coleman, Hart, Hill, Moore, Wilson-Smith, Parham and Myers

Council Member Wilson-Smith stated, "On the budget sheet for Finance, there is \$4,480 in travel, lodging dues and subscriptions. I know that there are some offices that actually have to pay dues for things. Is this a necessity for the finance department? Do we have to absolutely have to keep it? Do they absolutely have to go on the trips, conventions and training or can we save the \$4,480?"

Ms. Belton stated, "If you are talking about the travel amount it is at the discretion of council if they would like to limit no traveling. But the certification amounts are required of staff to maintain their certification in their positions."

Council Member Wilson-Smith stated, "It doesn't really stipulate certification so rather than make the motion to vote on this tonight I would like to ask you to look at this and come back and let us know what is what and to explain it better. The next item is the Freedom Support Center. It was explained in the PowerPoint at the last council meeting that the City is paying a total of \$8,035.94 in rent. But what we are obtaining from the renter's doesn't equal to the amount we are putting out and the amount that we are putting out for the utilities. I would therefore like to make a motion to direct the City Manager to have a discussion with the director of the Freedom Support Center in reference to the leases, which most of them are up 2017 to see if they are willing to increase their rent payments. Also to see what we can do to make the Freedom Support self-sustaining."

Mayor Myers stated, "You will not need to motion to ask her to do that Council Member Wilson-Smith. You can direct her to do that without a motion."

Council Member Wilson-Smith stated, "Under the economic development budget, in the PowerPoint I suggested that we can save \$7,000 with registration, training and travels expenses. Since then those line item budgets has been reduced and I still question the lodging, registration, training and lodging expenses rather than go with that motion tonight I would like the City Manager to come back with more clarity so that we know whether or not we can save that amount of money. We have \$2,333 allotted for beautification supplies on the grounds budget. I have concerns about that. Is this the same beautification that is on the City Manager's budget? And if so do we need both of them?"

Ms. Belton stated, "Currently the \$2,300 that is listed in the public works is for the projects when they need supplies for certain cutting of hedges and things that take place sometimes at some of the museum sites. Again, it's at council's discretion that if they think that we can leverage the use of the beautification in the City Manager's budget along with the DEQ grant if it is necessary to remove the \$2,300. I would then suggest leaving the \$2,300 and taking an additional \$2,300 out of the City Manager's budget."

Council Member Wilson-Smith stated, "Thank you. I apologize for taking a lot of time. I have been very concerned about recreation and Parks & Leisure budget and the amount of money that they will not have to work with the children. I am noticing that they too have \$7,000 for registration, training and travel expenses and

dues and subscriptions. I wonder if we can take that from those line items and use it towards the children, the youth in the City. Would this be in the jurisdiction of the City Manager or is this something that council would need to vote on?"

Ms. Belton stated, "The monies that are currently in the line item for the parks and leisure department. I can direct the director to reallocate those funds to youth programs via versus lodging and travel. Although, I would ask that I be able to provide clarification on exactly if the lodging and travel can all be removed for that the same that you proposed for the economic development and finance department."

Council Member Wilson-Smith stated, "Thank you. I am coming to the end. One of the last things that I talked about in the PowerPoint was that I felt that with all that is going on that with any organization who has issues with any kind we should come up with a plan of correction. In that plan of correction we did receive an updated policy from Mrs. Innis and Ms. Belton about City vehicle replacement. But I did want to ask one thing about that policy. One thing about that policy as a matter of plan of correction on page 6, item 7. The last statement in the second paragraph says 'any exception to the regulation of assigned parking at the location of the assigned department should be reported to the finance department in a manner similar to the reports for take home vehicles.' I am wondering with that could you insert another paragraph which would be item 8 I believe which would talk about take home vehicles. It would say something such as 'vehicles are allowed to be driven home on a daily basis by' and then give us a list of who will be driving and who will have those vehicles. It should also say 'those who receive approval by the City Manager and persons established as essential personnel.' And can you also stipulate a policy with the difference in an accident and an incident. Another matter for council to consider is that I made a motion some time ago. We have heard it a little bit lately and we did hear from a citizen tonight on it that it is within our charter to reinstate the CCRA. I would like to make the motion that City Council takes the necessary steps to reinstate the CCRA. And that is a motion."

Council Member Wilson-Smith made a motion that City Council takes the necessary steps to reinstate the CCRA. The motion was seconded by Council Member Hart. The motion was approved on roll call. On roll call vote, voting yes: Coleman, Hart, Hill, Moore, Wilson-Smith, Parham and Myers

Council Member Wilson-Smith stated, "And the last thing that I would like to ask the City Manager to do is that we had voted to have a spearhead volunteerism in the City and it was formed by our former HR person. This council had approved the motion to formulate a volunteer bank which is what we called it. My directive is to please ask HR to reinstate and get the ball rolling on the volunteer group. I have no further items."

Council Member Hart stated, "Good afternoon everyone. Couple of questions that I have from the community and one is the recycle pick-up. There is an issue with recycle products being picked up on time. So if we can get some information on that so that we can give to the citizens. The second thing is on Young's Road over the past weekend there was some major flooding going on. A lot of that is due from drainage back-up. We have a storm coming in this week. I actually had a whole neighborhood in ward that flooded. We have to work on cleaning the drainage throughout the City. There will be a Ward 7 meeting to be determined in October. I think that Mrs. Brown touched on it earlier about communications. I know that it is not necessarily council's place to hold meetings with City employees however there is a huge breakdown of communication when it comes down to what is happening in the City. And there are things that employees are going out and doing and there are things that council does not know until the last minute. There needs to be some type of meeting that we can all kind of get on the same page into moving this City forward. If the left does not know what the right is discussing then we are lost. I think that it is time for us to get those two in the room and just have conversation."

Council Member Coleman stated, "Last Thursday night if you were watching Channel 6 they reported that Ray Coleman had not paid his water bill which was very incorrect. I did contact Channel 6 and they had another Ray Coleman and they retracted that statement Friday. However, the damage has been done. Thank you."

Council Member Moore stated, "In reference and this ducktails Ms. Wilson-Smith discussion on Virginia Municipal League if we are no longer members, I know Risk Management and Petersburg Attorney's come

from them, if we are no longer a member of VML will we have to find monies for legal defense?"

Mr. Flynn stated, "First of all VML has a grace period through the end of the calendar year so Petersburg will remain a member from my understanding. VML Insurance does provide coverage to a number of entities that are not members of VML itself. I will take a look but there are a number of special authorities that are insured by VML Insurance but are not members of the league itself. I will follow-up on that and report to council."

Council Member Moore stated, "So what do we need to follow-up and redo the particular documents or reapply as a separate entity and not as a locality."

Mr. Flynn stated, "I will check on that it's my guess is that the insurance program will just continue providing the same coverage I expect but I don't know that definitively but I will get with the risk folks and get back with you. The insurance is provided through VaCorp and then Risk Management also has coverage for other stuff. As a result of that the membership of VML should not be a factor whatsoever. We will double check that and make sure. And work with the Risk Manager to make sure that the policies are in good shape."

Council Member Moore stated, "My second question of the night is in reference to Mr. Hart's question and Mrs. Brown statement with the water bill. I know I had to ask you to speak to the Subsection 19.2-201. This would basically describe to us what the special grand jury process would be."

Mr. Flynn stated, "The special jury process works typically through the Commonwealth Attorney's Office. The request to the Commonwealth Attorney with an allegation of some evidence of criminal wrong doing and ask either per presentation convenient special grand jury or possible go to a regular grand jury when it convenes. It would be one of the matters that the regular grand jury takes up. I would recommend that it be something that we work with the Commonwealth Attorney. It is the Commonwealth Attorney's responsibility of those actions."

Council Member Moore stated, "If you can bring that information back at the next meeting or however that is. If the current Commonwealth's Attorney is conflicted out will this move to a different locality."

Mr. Flynn stated, "It would be a petition of appointment of a special prosecutor to handle this. Typically, it would be a Commonwealth Attorney from another jurisdiction."

Council Member Hill stated, "Good evening. We have been talking about transparency and communication. I would like for us to start extending the olive branch and maybe if they so choose to give a report every second meeting of the month to the treasurer's department. And to the Commission of Revenue to give us a report of what is going on in their office. So all three entities will be able to talk and find out what is going on. We understand that you all are constitutional officers but as we talked in the past if we can allow a segment on the agenda for those two individuals to come and give a report on what is being taken in and what is being billed out. The City Manager will let us know that bills that we have coming up. That is the reason why we can show the transparency and then everybody will know what is going on and not just one individual because the money goes through two to three hands and not just City Council. They come to us and let us know everything and if they so choose and now we are extending that olive branch to you all to be on our agenda. I do not think that we need a motion for that. Also we have groups in the past that have adopted streets. I would like for us to follow up with them and if we can come out with a list that we can adopt a street to keep Petersburg clean. See if we can encourage the different organizations to come out and help keep the City clean. Also there needs to be more attention to our exits as far as keeping them clean. VDOT has cycle when they clean theirs up but if we can get ours to come by at least once or twice a day to clean up as well. Thank you."

Vice Mayor Parham stated, "I would like to start off with first we had a goal of getting all our fire hydrants checked by October 1<sup>st</sup>. I would like to get an update on where we are in that process."

Ms. Belton stated, "Pardon me for not having the exact number on the update but we were based on

the staff that we have with the utilities division we were able to have a specific person designated to this doing approximately 14-20 fire hydrants per day to expedite the process. This is currently been going on now for about seven working days. We did reach out to the fire department but based on the unavailability for personnel reasons that person has yet to work on the fire hydrant project. But that they are clock rating and we hope to have them in the upcoming weeks working with the utility department.”

Vice Mayor Parham stated, “Second of all we have a lot of properties that are vacant. We as a City cannot cut the grass on these private lots. I would like to check with the City Attorney to see if there is anything that we can do. I have a number of volunteers who would like to cut grass on some of these private lots to at least keep the City looking good but we need to get around that red tape of private property. Can you advise Mr. Flynn on that?”

Mr. Flynn stated, “I will take a look into it to make sure what the City Code is. I believe that the City has a provision for cutting grass and charging the owners. I think that you have full authority with volunteers also but I will follow-up on it.”

Vice Mayor Parham stated, “Also I would like to let everyone know that Ward 3 will be having a meeting on October 31<sup>st</sup>. It will be a joint meeting with myself and Ken Pritchett of the school board. Again that is October 31<sup>st</sup> at 6:00pm at Walnut Hill Elementary School. Thank you.”

#### **10. CITY MANAGER'S AGENDA:**

Ms. Belton stated, “Thank you. I would like to first start my report by saying that the citizens are really showing that they are supporting the City by paying their bills on time. I am very thankful for that and for those actions. Also I would like to thank staff for all the work that they are currently doing and not only their everyday jobs but taking on some of the other jobs as well as for the treasurer staff for the first quarter of exemplary revenues. We are very happy with the outcome thus far.”

I would ask for that public hearing and I would ask Ms. Jackson to do the necessary advertising on getting the right language for the ad. This would be the City and City Council moving forward.

7. **OFFICIAL PUBLIC HEARINGS: (In accordance with the Rules of Council, public comment will be heard before discussion by Council. Once discussion has started, no further input from the public will be accepted. Each speaker will be limited to three (3) minutes.)**

No items for this portion of the agenda.

8. **PUBLIC INFORMATION PERIOD:** The Public Information Period is established by the Rules of Council to hear input from City residents or owners of businesses in the City. It will last for a maximum of 30 minutes. Speakers will be called in the order that they have signed up to speak. If there are ten or fewer speakers, each shall speak for a maximum of 3 minutes. If there are more than six (6) people desiring to speak, the time allotted to each person may be adjusted or the number of speakers limited to meet the time limitation. A speaker may speak on items **except those that are listed on tonight's Council agenda.** Any matter brought before the attention of the City Council during the public

information period will not be acted upon by the City Council at this meeting.

Richard Stewart, 129 Rolfe Street, stated, "Why I am here today? My community sent me to ask a question. Why you are all trying to kill us? That is the question. What is happening in Pocahontas? The waste treatment traffic has gone crazy. They have no curfew. They come anytime of the night. They come in and there is noise. There are crushed rocks and fumes. People cannot sit on their porch. They called EPA and EEQ. Something is getting ready to happen and there might be a suit against it because they are treating us so bad. Even I had to get a sample. You that there (pause) that's dust. This is what we are encountering in Pocahontas. There's a 300 foot area to put crushed rocks that Mr. Johnson told them not to put it there. But that there is 300 feet of crushed rock on the east side of Sapony Street. Today 78 trucks came through. Can you imagine how much dust there was that came and landed on our house. One of the most historic houses over there called the "Stephen's House" that the Washington Post exhibited is rotting away. Dust is all over it and the people want to know why are you all trying to kill us. Why have the curfew changed for the trucks and why so many trucks. I stopped one off them today and he said he bringing water. What water he carrying to the waste treatment plant. I thought it already had water there. They are killing Pocahontas and we cannot put up with that. EPA I think may come in there tomorrow. I don't know when they are coming in there but right now we can't open our doors. We can't even operate our air conditioners. You look inside your house there is smoke. I hope the City Council goes in and investigate because big things getting ready to happen. Because the EPA and the rest of them get involved in it I don't know where the suit is going. Things have to stop. This is what is out there now "Dust." I thank you."

Carl Ridley, 15 N. Crater Road, stated, "My comments are directed to the man who would be king, Mr. Myers. It seems that you have not learned anything or are aware of Hillary Clinton as it pertains to emails. Well it appears that you have email controversy of your own. For example, the one where you label a small minority, which I am a part of, as racist. And now other emails have surfaced indicating your attempt to stop the authority of City Manager and Council to implement your own agendas. You seem to have some diluted concept that you are the authority and that you set positives for others to follow. Let me remind you that your duties as Mayor are to shake hands, cut ribbons, kiss babies and reside as chairman over council. Your apparent subversive campaign smacks the codes and violations. The last two are against a council person. I respectively ask you to stay in your lane and stop acting as commanding chief in this City. A position in which you are not clearly qualified. Council, how long do you intend on letting Mr. Myers bully and embarrass you and the City of Petersburg. Resend his mayorship ASAP."

Ron Flock, 1708 Pender Avenue, stated, "I would also like to speak regarding the emails serving the ACM of duties. The Mayor recently made demands in an email on behalf of City Council without the knowledge of vote or approval by city Council restricting the acting city manager of duties and responsibilities while elevating his position to the presiding member of City Council in direct conflict with Section 3.4 of the City Charter. It states, "the mayor should reside over the meetings of council and shall have the same right to vote and speak therein as other members and shall have no veto power. He shall be recognized as the head of City government for ceremonial purposes, military law and service of civil process." The Mayor's actions by definition are malfeasances. That definition says the performance by the public official of an act that is legally unjustified, harmful or contrary to law, wrongdoing used especially of an act in violation of public trust without a doubt. I would ask the City Council in interest of and on behalf of the residence of the City of Petersburg to demonstrate its resolve in conducting themselves in an honorable manner and defending the residence against those about the City Charter for their own interest and agendas to make a motion and pass that motion to take action and reprimand and remove Mayor Myers as his position as Mayor effective immediately on the grounds of malfeasances. Each member of council in your oath of office to uphold laws in constitution of the State of Virginia as well as the Charter of Petersburg. It is time for each of you to step up and demonstrate to the residence of our City that you will abide by that oath."

Prince Duke, 2793 S. Crater Road, stated, "I am here to ask for Council and the new City Attorney questions. Recently citizens have been informed that the City is getting a consulting firm to come and manage the fiscal City by the name of Robert Bobb Group. The cost of their services for five months is going to be \$350,000. My question to council is that if we don't have the money to fund the students, if you don't have the money to pay the bills of the City, if you don't have the money to supply the appropriate equipment for the Fire

Department and if you have the nerve and audacity to take 10% from the hard working employees of the City. When you are losing good officers, good fire department people and plus they are suffering and struggling in the City where are you going to find \$350,000 to pay this group. And if you have this money somewhere then why don't you use it to help the City pay a couple of bills. Because the Robert Group is coming in and they are going to bring a City Manager, human resource person, a finance person and other people. Now these jobs I think some of them are already being filled here. So if you are bringing them in does that mean that those that in that position aren't qualified are you going to terminate them or not. That's my first question. I don't think it's fair that you ask the citizens of Petersburg to sacrifice so much heavily beyond increasing taxes and duties too. I have several questions directed to you because we have so many issues. I would like you to please let the citizens of Petersburg know what are the specific powers, authorities, responsibilities and duties of the Mayor per the Charter. What are the specific parameters that creates the need for an emergency closed session of council? Because as other speakers have said it seems our Honorable Mayor have somehow felt like he is an executive. This City has a weak Mayor and a strong Council. The gentleman has not only violated the City Code and he has violated the Charter and he has violated State Law. You need to recognize that because you are about to get sued. You need to read that email and read it very, very carefully. He used his office to intimidate. If members of council, this gentleman represents you when Johnson was here Johnson beat his wife nobody spoke up against it. Johnson had a DUI and nobody spoke against him. This lady carried a position to do a job that nobody would do.

Mayor Myers stated, "Mr. Duke the clerk has asked you and your time is up."

Ms. Jackson stated, "Before I call the next speaker I will ask of everyone, when the buzzer goes off in three minutes, please respectively close your comments. So that everyone can have a chance to talk and everyone can be heard. I really appreciate it."

Michael Edwards, 409 Grove Avenue, stated, "Good Evening Mayor Myers, Vice Mayor Parham and Members of City Council and Petersburg citizens. I come before you to remind you of September 6<sup>th</sup> when we met at the high school. How the citizens begged and pleaded for public safety. Now I know this City is in a financial struggles. But every day we either read the Progress-Index, Richmond Times or Channel 6, 8 and 12 and we make headlines. This is not a City that should be making headlines every day especially negative. When I read the article from Channel 6 I had to go by Market Street to see this ancient fire truck. When I went up there I was somewhat dismayed. We have a truck, Truck 1, which has nothing but problems since the day we bought it. And now that truck still sits at a shop waiting for payment. We have to go across the bridge to Colonial Heights. The very same ones that sit over there and laugh at us and tell us that we are nothing but trash across the bridge and borrow a fire truck. What's going to happen when Colonial Heights says no more? What's going to happen if Hopewell, Prince George or Dinwiddie doesn't come to our aid? What's going to happen when we can no longer pay our bills? Public safety should not be put in jeopardy no longer. The high rises downtown depend on these trucks. The rest of the City depends on these trucks. Now we are bringing this firm in here. I am like the rest of them, if this man can perform a miracle to turn this City around then it is money well spent. But if he can't then I am going to question the judgment of this council to authorize whoever, the City Manager, the Operation Manager or whoever we are going to put in charge to release these funds. Make a good judgment call. And piggybacking on the previous speaker when Mr. Johnson was first hired not even a year into his job he made headlines for beating his wife. Well I have no respect for a man who beats on a woman. If you are going to beat on someone beat on a man that can beat you back. This woman has stepped into a mess to a poker hand that you all dealt her without even a winning hand. I read the article from Richmond Times on the meeting at the train station. A woman went into her office at the transit station wiping away tears from her eyes. Have we become so self-centered and developed such a big ego that we will attack a woman that is trying to do a job with the mess that she is dealt but you would not fire a man that beat his wife.

Linwood Christian, 410 Mistletoe Street, stated, "One thing I have to say is that as a father when I got custody of my son I had to take his mother to court and have her put in jail for not paying child support. Any parent would take care of their children, right or wrong? Even if you don't have children you make sure your children are taken care of. So with that I want to know if we can find monies whether it be from people that resigned and not get rehired to pay Robert Bobb who was sent out of Richmond to turn this City around double

what Mrs. Yerby needed for summer programs then what is the problem. It is \$350,000 yet you took \$150,000 from recreation. You are not taking care of you children but yet you will be quick to put them in jail. Because when our kids have nothing to do and people come up here and complain that our kids have nothing to do what you are going to do council. You are going to try and throw the finger back on us. But guess what you all control the first strings. You all are the providers and you are supposed to take care of your kids. Because if I didn't take care of my children and you all had to do it you would want me to pay my debt. Is that right? We want you all to pay your debt. Let Robert Bobb stay wherever he comes from and take care of Petersburg first. We have streets that look like hell but you are bringing Robert Bobb in here close to \$400,000. Also I remember a statement was made that even if all of you all gave up your salaries it wouldn't make-up what is going on. Lead by example. Ward 1 councilwoman is the only one that gave up her salary and you all have done nothing. How can you expect up to do what we are supposed to do and you do not make any attempt to do it. That's what leads by example mean. Are we prepared if something happened here like it happened in Flint. We haven't gotten any reports. I am going to close on this note. It is interesting that you all now want the treasurer and commissioner. I applaud our commissioner. Even when she is busy she will stop and talk to customers and break things down and talk with you. Now you want her to come in here with others and give reports when we have been asking for this when you were Mayor Mr. Moore. And you all haven't done it yet. In other words, what I am saying is two things. Lead by example and take care of your children first."

Dolores Smith, 410 Mistletoe Street, stated, "I do not know what to say because I am really angry and disgusted with you all that is sitting here. What I think about Bobb or whoever you are bringing here with six figures is that if you all is paying this guy to turn us around to find out what we doing then why are you all still sitting there. Why don't you relieve your seat and salary and put Bobb up there to handle things and then you all need to get the hell out of dodge."

Raymond Crockett, 248 Southwood Drive, stated, "Good evening I'm back. Mayor, Vice Mayor, City Council and new City Attorney and Interim City Manager good evening. I want to welcome our new City Attorney. I hope you all let him do his job. His job is to guide you all. It's not what you want to hear but give you all the facts and the law. When you don't want to hear something don't get mad and say we are going to fire him. He is giving you the facts of the law. Once we had a City Attorney and council got rid of him because he was dealing them with facts and the law and they didn't like it. I hope they let Mr. Preston do his job. I read in the paper that Mr. Moore was talking about the water bill. I have a problem with my water bill. We need a full investigation going on with this water bill. I have a business and my water bill jumped over \$200 and something dollars in one month. They said because I have a two inch water meter. That business has been here since 1990. I had a two inch water meter then. I was paying bi-monthly and it was running about \$300 to \$400 something dollars. I got a bill last month for \$530 for one month. Because I have a two inch water meter without running water with my water hooked up and my sewer line it is costing me \$178 a month without running any water at all. My customers are on a fixed income and I cannot raise their price of washing clothes every time the City goes up. Because what is going to happen is that people will not be able to afford to wash clothes here. We set back and make decisions and all we have to do is increase and we don't think about the downsize of what is going to happen to the City and the citizens in the City. The State came in and did an audit. The State came out and told us everything we need to do. What is the difference in what the State did and what Bobb is going to do for us. The State comes in and looks at the City's finance record. How did we get this way? They waited until the last minute to do what we have to do. I go back and say what I said in May. If you are running a business and sales drop and revenues drop coming into the City there is not but one thing for you to do. Call supervisors in and department heads and tell every employee that everyone's job is on the line and that they better do a good job. You have to have a layoff. Do not wait until Christmas to tell the people that you are going to have a layoff. The State department is coming up short and what did they say. They said that they are going to have to have a layoff. They have a rainy day fund but we do not have a rainy day fund. Thank you."

Vernel Gannaway, 652 Old Wagner Road, stated, "I came to dido on every person that has come up to the podium. And one thing that I want to say is that I am disgusted. I am disgusted with all of you that said 'aye' because you have been influenced by somebody that said you are going to be great in your new position. When you start being over people it's a problem. You have a person that is the Interim City Manager that is trying to get something done. We didn't complain about it. But you have your private meetings with people. You

talk about transparency and that you are together. Some of your council members don't even know that you have your private meetings and sessions and its time up with that. I am tired of closed sessions because they are a bunch of lies. Your liars and thieves. And those of you that are being influenced I do not care if it's the Pope or pastor or bishop. If he is influencing you and you think you can come and run this City then it's not going to happen. This City was meant for greatness. We have people that are in place that is right here that can do a better job then what you are doing. We have people that really have their heart for this City. It's a time up for all this extra and stuff that you are trying to do like laying off people. I never seen so much mess. What's wrong with this picture? We have people that have been around here for years and you come in here and change the page. We not going to pay anybody. We are going to pay it the way we want to pay it. You have a person right there. Why go and pay \$300,000? Stupid. Thank you."

Barb Rudolph, 1675 Mt. Vernon Street, stated, "It's been about six months since I have asked you Council Members, how could you tolerate keeping the Mayor we have? He was an embarrassment to the City then. I listed a number of things that have happened. Mr. Mayor you were out sick that night but I am sure that you ready the minutes or heard about it. I think things have really gone from bad to worst. I am not going to try and repeat everything because there were a lot of good points that were made tonight. Oh and thank you most of what you said I have in my notes so I will skip over it quickly. But I would comment that there has been an endless parade of closed and special meetings. They have actually multiplied that those occur more frequently than regular meetings. I would like to know what you all are afraid of talking about in public. What is it about the public asking questions that make you seem to go more and more in hiding? It's very strange and partly why everyone is looking at Petersburg because they are like what is going on here and no one will talk about it. And we already talked about the Mayor and emails but I would think that you all would be concerned. He really needs to stay off the email between racist republican rants that got picked up all over the country and published and the latest about this meeting that was held to talk about the responsibilities and the authority of the Acting City Manager and how that went down with no public notification. I would think that his people would be learning. I would also wonder isn't it kind of embarrassing in a City when an announcement goes out that we are going to hire a new City Manager from Fayetteville and everyone is gathered to this event but a vote hasn't taken place. It turns out that this individual was not selected. And then yesterday there was a meet and greet scheduled for Robert Bobb Group but no vote was taken to hire Robert Bobb. And as of the end of yesterday his firm was not hired. It seems like these things would be like egg on the face. Council I have to ask you again is Mr. Myers the best we can do for leadership of this City and Council. Thank you."

**BACKGROUND:** The National Infrastructure Protection Plan and in particular the Sector Specific Plan for the Water Sector developed by the United States Environmental Protection Agency identifies the development of a Water and Wastewater Agency Response Network in each State as an important means of helping to ensure resilient water and wastewater infrastructure in the public interest. Virginia's longstanding, nationally-recognized professional associations known as the Virginia Section of the American Water Works Association ("VAWWA") and the Virginia Water Environment Association ("VWEA") have jointly formed the Virginia Water and Wastewater Agency Response Network ("VAWARN") Committee to develop the EPA-recommended network and associated procedures for implementation in Virginia.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Recommend that City Council approve the resolution and mutual aid agreement to allow the Virginia Water/Wastewater Agency Response Network to provide rapid short-term deployment of emergency services to restore the critical operations of the impacted utility operations in an emergency.

**16-R-60 A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF THE VIRGINIA WATER AND WASTEWATER AGENCY RESPONSE NETWORK MUTUAL AID AGREEMENT.**

Council Member Hart stated, "Good evening. There will be a Ward 7 meeting held on October 25<sup>th</sup> at Stuart School at 6:30pm."

Council Member Hart made a motion that they dismiss the case of Smith and Myers as their agreements through the mediator have been reached. There was discussion among City Council Members. The motion was seconded by Council Member Hill. The motion was approved on roll call. On roll call vote, voting yes: Coleman, Hart, Hill, Moore and Parham; \*could not vote due to vote pertaining to them: Wilson-Smith and Myers

Council Member Coleman stated, "Ward 6 will have a meeting on next month at A.P. Hill School. We will make the specific date at our next meeting."

Council Member Moore stated, "Thank you madam clerk. I've got three items in reference to the forensic audit. I believe the Acting City Manager will talk about that in her portion so I will pass that at this point. Also, I asked for information in reference to the special grand jury. The City Attorney in his portion may speak to that issue. Lastly, I would like to talk about fire. It is a great question that Mr. Edwards asked on whether Hopewell, Dinwiddie or Prince George come to the call. I can give you a 100% answer. They will always come to the call of Petersburg as we go to them. So we need to make sure that we go ahead....Information has been provided that we most likely will be getting 'Truck 1' back the end of the week. I will let the City Manager talk about that. There has been payment. I would like to get the report on the status of the items that had to be canceled. I understand pretty much that the trucks had to be specially built. So it's not the matter of a car dealership where they are sitting on a lot and can go to somebody else. Can you provide a little bit of background about that. There is a possibility after we go through the books that there is a way that we can get a plan to get new trucks. Those are the items that I have. Thank you."

Council Member Hill stated, "Yes, good evening. Ward 2 will be having a meeting next month to be announced. Also I like for the City Attorney to either have meeting with us whether publicly or privately about the ways of Rules of Council. These last events that just happened not too long ago, I felt like we need to be briefed on special meetings or phone calls or things of that nature. Ethically I think that we can do better as a council as a whole. A lot of us are being thrown under the bus because of the actions of a few. So with that being said, City Attorney I need for you to set up a meeting very soon and go over the Rules of Council and the ordinance of the City as it pertain to City Council Members as it relates to duties and responsibilities on what to do and what not to do. That will be all."

Vice Mayor Parham stated, "First of all Ward 3 meeting will take place now on November 14<sup>th</sup> instead of on October 31<sup>st</sup>. Mr. Pritchett had a conflict for that date so we are moving it to Monday, November 14<sup>th</sup> at 6:00pm at Walnut Hill Elementary School. On June 21<sup>st</sup>, 2016, Council adopted an amended motion for Citizenry Committee, which had the committee end at the end of October however; the committee would like an amendment to extend the committee at least until November 7<sup>th</sup> to finish their deliberations."

Vice Mayor Parham made a motion that Council amend ordinance 16-30 allowing the committee to continue work and make deliberations until November 7<sup>th</sup>. The motion was seconded by Mayor Myers. There was discussion among City Council Members and staff. The motion was approved on roll call. On roll call vote, voting yes: Coleman, Hart, Hill, Moore, Wilson-Smith, Parham and Myers

**16-ORD-44 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 16-ORD-30 ALLOWING THE COMMITTEE TO CONTINUE WORK AND MAKE DELIBERATIONS UNTIL NOVEMBER 7<sup>TH</sup>.**

Vice Mayor Parham stated, "The next item I have is to discuss with the Interim City Manager the status of our museums here. I know we wanted to have these museums at least partially open through the holidays.

The holidays are about here upon us as I speak. I would like to move forward to make a decision on opening the museums on November 1<sup>st</sup> and choose a group to operate them. Could you discuss that with us?"

Ms. Belton stated, "Currently, we have received additional proposals outside the original solicited proposals. There were a total of three proposals that were submitted. Currently, based on some of the proposals we do have some questions that we would like to go back. But I do think we could setup interviews with those or question time period for each of those individuals to answer those same questions we will ask to each of them. I can through the clerk provide you with a recommendation to accommodate the November 1<sup>st</sup> deadline if indeed you do not want to do it through a motion at the next November meeting."

Vice Mayor Parham stated, "Also we are looking at three proposals. Can we try to expedite that because time is of the essences? We have people that like to come tour our historic places throughout the holidays. Hopefully by November 1<sup>st</sup> we can get together and get a decision made. If you need a motion I am prepared to give you one."

Ms. Belton stated, "Councilman it is not necessary for a motion for me. But I can get you the information. It would be up to council if you wanted any motion in deciding on the one group that you do decide on."

Vice Mayor Parham stated, "How soon can we have those options available to us?"

Ms. Belton stated, "I can have them for you Monday of next week."

Vice Mayor stated, "Thank you. Also on yesterday we had a chance to talk to the In-Tek group on obtaining federal dollars to help provide funds for our emergency services, our firemen and our schools. "

Vice Mayor Parham made a motion that he moves pursuant to Section 2.2403F "Emergency Procurement" I move to direct the Acting City Manager to sign and execute immediately the In-Tek Memorandum of Understanding. The motion was seconded by Council Member Moore. The motion was approved on roll call. On roll call vote, voting yes: Hart, Hill, Moore, Wilson-Smith, Parham and Myers; Abstain: Coleman (due to the fact that there are too many unanswered questions)

Vice Mayor Parham made a motion that he moves pursuant to Section 2.2403F "Emergency Procurement" I move to direct the Acting City Manager to sign and execute immediately the Robert Bobb Group Emergency Contract. The motion was seconded by Council Member Moore. There was discussion among City Council Members.

Vice Mayor Parham stated, "City Attorney can we go into closed session to discuss this document? Is it possible for him to take a look at it?"

#### **10. CITY MANAGER'S AGENDA:**

Ms. Belton stated, "This is the update for the forensic financial audit services. City Council had requested the City to solicit services on behalf of the forensic financial audit. The purpose of the RFP was to solicit funds to provide investigations and research and ensure citywide compliance with the generally

accepted accounting principles. On June 13<sup>th</sup>, 2016, the City received four proposals. On September 28<sup>th</sup>, the committee for the RFP-0035 met with three prospective firms. The top two rate firms have been chosen for negotiations. We will negotiate with the firms on October 19<sup>th</sup>, 2016. The firm 'Number 1' estimates a total of 1,280 hours to complete the project. The fee for services are approximately \$300,000. 'Firm 2' estimates a total of 1,600 hours to complete the project with a fee of approximately \$192,000. These are both nonbinding estimates and the committee will make an award and recommendation after the October 19<sup>th</sup> meeting."

- a. City Manager's Report
1. What is the status of the City's drainage system and can it be addressed prior to the Hurricane Matthew?
  - a. The Public Works staff began a City wide effort to remove sediment and debris from storm drain system weeks prior to the arrival of Hurricane Matthew. Although a number of drains, ditches, and drop inlets have been addressed, Public Works continues to clean drainage areas on an as needed basis. Please contact Daniel Harrison, the Acting Public Works Director to provide him with areas of concern.
2. Can the City pay more attention to the exit ramps?
  - a. A team was assigned from both Police and Public Works to address the entrances and exits into the City. We hope to see improvement in the coming weeks.
3. Can the volunteer policy be developed?
  - a. The City of Petersburg's Human Resource Department has developed a Volunteer Service Program that is designed to provide opportunities for individuals to become involved in City efforts and to provide assistance to City employees in various services and needs. These policies and procedures govern the utilization of all volunteers for all city departments, except Police and Fire, whose volunteer policies may exceed these requirements. The Department of Human Resources will serve as a volunteer for the City of Petersburg. City departments are encouraged to embrace and operate a volunteer program. The City Administration believes that volunteerism is a charitable and rewarding experience for all parties involved. We have provided Council with the Policy for their review.
4. What is the notice requirement for employees subject to the Reduction in Force and was this applied with the current reduction in force?
  - a. Administration Regulations require employees impacted by reduction in force to be given 15 calendar days' notice prior to a separation of employment. The impacted part-time employees, impacted by the reduction in force, were also given the same 15 day notice.
5. Is Virginia Municipal League impacted by the budget cuts?
  - a. Currently VML is handling a lawsuit for the City but they no longer provide our insurance coverage. Risk Management has confirmed that there is no impact to this lawsuit by the City not being a VML (as we do now with VACORP). Occurrence based coverage simply means that the insurance coverage in force at the time the incident occurred will continue to cover any lawsuits filed after the policy is cancelled or not renewed; as long as, the incident giving rise to the lawsuit occurred during the period the insurance coverage was in effect.
6. Eliminate travel and lodging budgets for Council, Parks and Leisure and Economic Development.
  - a. Have received information regarding this travel. All is related to staff development and national conferences. The departments did request to keep these funds, but due to no foreseen traveling in the future I recommend that they can all be removed from the budget, if Council so wants.
7. Clarification of incident and accident.
  - a. Council has been provided an updated City vehicle draft policy.

8. Update on fire hydrants.
  - a. There are approximately a total of 1,100 fire hydrant maintenance inspections that has been completed. Approximately 503 were completed by utility and approximately over 500 were completed by the fire department. If weather permits the completion date should be the end of November, early December.
  
9. Financial update this quarter.
  - a. The actual 2016 real estate revenue collected from August 15, 2016 thru August 9<sup>th</sup> have been \$5,504,019. Obligations in revenues, the public has been provided with obligations and revenues that show for the month of October. The date being October 1<sup>st</sup> thru 31<sup>st</sup>. The sources are the daily cash reports. The available funds as of October 17, 2016, from the SunTrust bank account is approximately \$5.3 million. The key obligations due for the month of October total \$8.6 million. The key estimated revenues based on the balance moved forward from September, we will be able to meet the full month of October key obligations. We currently met them as of date. We also have enough money to cover moving forward into out November obligations. The cash flow projections also show that the additional analysis tools to be used in September is adding the liability for the data that is being used. Both show that the City would have met these obligations. Revenue should continue to be monitored closely and there should be limited payment of any other obligations not listed to council. Monitoring will effectively limit the payment that of the listed obligations must occur in order to prepare for the month of November.

12. **CITY ATTORNEY'S AGENDA:**

Mr. Preston stated, "I will briefly address Mr. Moore's inquiry about the special grand jury. I just received the order on Friday from the court indicating that a special grand jury of Chesterfield has been appointed. Mr. Davenport, Commonwealth Attorney of Chesterfield County, has been appointed to convene a special grand jury. A special grand jury will consist of seven to eleven citizens. People who are not from Petersburg and people who are not from the region who obviously are good citizens to investigate potential wrongdoing in the City of Petersburg government. I have not been contacted officially in terms of what information they are going to be requiring from our office but I can assure you that we will cooperate with the special grand jury and Mr. Davenport in every way that we can. At this point in time I am not sure if a forensic audit is something that Petersburg ought to be considering paying for in light of the fact that we have a special grand jury that is going to be impaneled. Of course I haven't met with Mr. Davenport yet to ascertain whether or not he plans to do a forensic audit. It seems to me that in order to do a proper investigation some type of forensic audit would be necessary and maybe we can use the funds of Chesterfield County or the state, whoever is going to pay for that, in lieu of our own funds as the Acting City Manager indicated. One bid is around \$300,000 which is a lot of money as well as the \$192,000. So at this point in time I don't know where we are at in that process but again I would recommend that we hold off on pursuing that forensic audit until such time we find out whether Chesterfield will do a forensic audit as well."

The solar panels can sit as low as two feet from the ground to a maximum height of about 22' from the ground. The solar panels are installed in rows and looks like a garden. Other than a fence around the property and a transformer with other ground equipment that is part of the generation, transmission and distribution system there will be no other buildings or structures.

This method of providing energy is fairly new in the State of Virginia, but you are beginning to see these panels popping up on large tracts of former farm land in different parts of Virginia, and North Carolina.
