

Chief's Advisory Committee


The Chief's Advisory Committee acts as an advisory body to the Chief of Police on police policy and resource issues; and serves as a conduit for the community to address safety issues and community problems. The overall mission of the committee is to help the Petersburg Police Department provide quality policing services in partnership with the Petersburg community.

Public Information Office

The Public Information Office provides the media and public with accurate and timely information regarding investigations, traffic issues, public safety, achievements and special events. Media have 24 hour access for urgent news or updates to continuing stories. In 2015 the unit aided in stories related to animal control, major crimes and public interest.

Watch Commander

The Watch Commander represents the Chief of Police when he is not present. Also known as the Night Supervisor, the Watch Commander is the Operational Commander of the Department's personnel and facilities during nights, weekends, and holidays. The Watch Commander monitors police radio traffic and responds to and takes command of any unusual event, crime, or other critical situation; and notifies the appropriate members of the Command Staff about serious incidents and noteworthy events. The Watch Commander reports directly to the Chief of Police.

Office of Professional Standards

The Office of Professional Standards (OPS) is committed to maintaining the integrity of the Petersburg Bureau of Police by administering an internal system in which objectivity, fairness, and justice are assured by an intensive, impartial investigation and review of all issues brought forth. The Petersburg Bureau of Police encourages citizens and employees to report legitimate complaints of inadequate police service or police misconduct. Initiatives implemented by OPS were designed to facilitate the management of personnel accountability.

Administrative Services Division

Other responsibilities include administrative support, fiscal management, records and technology, policy and planning, recruitment and training, emergency communications, performance measures, personnel strength and accounting, animal care and control, and special projects as directed by the Chief of Police.

Office of Fiscal Management

The Office of Fiscal Management is responsible for managing the police department's budgeted funds and payroll issues.

The Office of Fiscal Management resolves all payroll issues, provides valuable knowledge regarding city benefits, and processes payroll and personnel changes for the bureau.

Office of Training & Development

The Office of Training & Development is tasked with moving forward with our agency's priorities, goals and objectives through design, development, and delivery of "focused" training.

The Office is currently staffed with Two Career Police Officers and in addition to "In-House" training, has oversight responsibilities as it relates to Police Recruit Basic Academy Training, In-Service Academy Training for sworn Police Officers, civilian personnel and Auxiliary Officers.



Emergency Communications



The Communications Unit exists within the Bureau to facilitate around the clock communications services, channeling information and service requests to appropriate service elements, utilizing a myriad of communications technology and skills in its fundamental operation as a support unit of the Bureau of Police. One may say that the Communications Unit is the “lifeline” between the individual police officer, firefighter, or someone calling for assistance.

Social Media

The Special Projects Unit is comprised of a single officer who organizes and coordinates our involvement in community events, and develops and manages programs for our youth.

Information Technology Unit

End-user support, desktop support, computer repair and upgrades, mobile phone support, MIFI and WIFI network access and support are part of the IT Unit's duties. In addition, the IT Unit provides 24/7 support for the department's servers and applications, to include, managing, upgrading, repairing, documenting, and troubleshooting all IT related issues.





The IT Team assisted with the migration of new utility server to manage our Records Management, Computer-Aided Dispatch and Mobile Field Reporting Applications. Additional new desktop and laptop computers were acquired to replace outdated computers, and assigned to Uniformed Field Operations and Administrative end-users.

Records Management

Records Management is comprised of 3 full-time and 2 part-time staff members. Records Management is responsible for entering and verifying Incident Based Reports (IBRs), accident/crash reports, taxi permits, weapons permits, arrest summons, pawn tickets, FOIA requests, Subpoenas and the routine submission of Crime Statistics to Virginia State Police.

School Resource Officers

School Resource Officers are responsible for enhancing the educational environment for the students and staff at their assigned schools. They interact with students daily to build good rapport with them and to teach them the importance of obeying the law. Resource Officers work closely with school guidance counselors and administrators to help the students find solutions to their problems. Police Explorer Program, G.R.E.A.T, Drug free world lessons, Bullying Prevention, and the Summer Youth Enrichment Program are just a few of the activities essential to the SROs mission to ensure a safe school environment

Petersburg Animal Care and Control

Petersburg Animal Care and Control is an open door public shelter located in historic Petersburg, Virginia. We partner with many venues to get the maximum exposure for our adoptable animals such as Petsmart, and multiple website and social media outlets. We believe all animals deserve the best resolution we can provide for them. We help people with their animal problems and try to keep as many animals in their home.

We are an enforcement agency and take our role seriously in standing up for the legally guaranteed rights of animals of all kinds. We love animals and show it daily.

Special Services Unit

The Special Services Unit is supervised by Lieutenant Sheldon Wills, Unit Commander. The Special Services Division is responsible for ensuring safe travel of motorist through the great City of Petersburg. Its primary responsibility is to respond to motor vehicle crashes, traffic complaints, inoperable vehicles and conducting enforcement. The Traffic Officers also conduct STEALTH STAT reports (vehicle speed data collection), monitor traffic concerns and any other motor vehicle related issues, such as traffic control within the city.

The Special Services Unit maintains and manages the annual DMV Highway Safety Grant initiatives. In 2015 the Special Services Division conducted 208 OPERATIONS (Saturation Patrols/Checkpoints). During these Operations the unit stopped over 1,500 motor vehicle operator's for violations, these motor vehicle stops resulted in over 1,600 traffic summons. Other duties include the issuing Taxi Cab permits. The unit is frequently called out for Fatal Crashes, operation of the Intoxilyzer and incidents of inclement weather relative to public safety.

Any parade, funeral, or other special event will often require the utilization of labor and resources from this small, yet capable unit. Special enforcement such as, DUI Enforcement, Click it or Ticket, Stationary/Saturation checkpoints, License Plate Reader, and Highway Safety Patrol are essential initiatives that preserve the safety of the motoring public.

The Petersburg *ACE* Team is an inter-agency task force assembled to abate or bring into compliance any troublesome property (*Residential or Commercial*) within the City of Petersburg.

The *ACE* team is composed of representatives from: The Bureau of Police, Fire Marshal's Office, Code Compliance, VA Department of Health, Treasurer Office, Commissioner of Revenue's Office, Social Services, City Attorney's Office, Commonwealth Attorney's Office, Planning and Zoning Office and the Virginia ABC Board. Enforcement by the *ACE* team is enacted when 3 areas of concern span these agencies.

Field Operations Division

The Field Operations Division is the Uniform Patrol component of the agency. Uniform Patrol Officers are on the streets twenty-four hours a day, seven days per week. These officers are the first responders to citizen requests for assistance, reports of crimes, and the initial police representation at any significant incident which occurs. When not responding to assigned calls, the officers of the Field Operations Division are establishing relationships with businesses and citizens, and watching for individuals and circumstances that have the potential to become problems for the City.

Field Operations Division is divided into two Precincts. The Southeast Precinct, commanded by Lieutenant Carl Moore, and the Northwest Precinct, commanded by Lieutenant Chris Walker. Each Precinct is divided into four beats which are patrolled by officers from six units. To deter problem behavior, more than one unit is deployed when analysis indicates a higher potential for crime.





Uniform Patrol

Uniformed Field Operations is the primary provider of police services for the residents of the City of Petersburg. The Division deploys approximately 41 officers to the 23.2 square miles of the City on a 24-hour basis. Personnel are prepared to respond to both emergency and non-emergency calls for service in each of the City's two precincts. Each Precinct is further broken down into four police "beats". Officers and their respective Sergeants work a variety of shifts in a permanently assigned beat enabling them to interact with community members and work in partnership to prevent and solve problems within their neighborhoods.




Northwest Precinct





Uniform Patrol




Arrests and Traffic Summons





K-9 Unit

K9s are trained for a variety of tasks. First and foremost they are "locating tools". That is they are primarily used to locate evidence and people, using their superior senses, primarily their keen sense of smell. With 225 million scent receptors compared to humans mere 5 million, a German Shepherd has the ability to detect odor thousands of times better than humans. Taking advantage of this ability, LEO can save valuable time and resources by locating evidence much quicker and with greater certainty than several people searching the same area.






Crisis Response Team


The Crisis Response Team (CRT) provides immediate on-site support to those affected by an emergency incident. The division consists of three units, including the Major Crimes Unit (MCU), the Special Operations Response Team (SORT), and the Forensics/Evidence Unit



The primary responsibilities of the Investigative Services Division is to conduct thorough investigations of felonies and serious misdemeanor crimes occurring within the City of Petersburg Commanded by Lieutenant David Cassort, the Investigative Services Division, is comprised of the Major Crimes Unit, and includes Special Operations Response Team, Document Services, Forensics, and the Fugitive Task Force. These units address serious crimes that require specialization and/or more intense investigation.

Special Operations Response Team

The Special Operations Response Team (SORT) is deployed to track and suppress violent offenders in the City of Petersburg. SORT is a compact and flexible team of officers whose assignments rapidly change in response to crime trends and other identified special needs. When deployed, SORT closely monitors statistical information generated through the analytical process and develops active crime reduction strategies in response. SORT works to support of all divisions within the organization by providing resources that specifically targets the reduction of criminal activity.


Torch Run
